<u>Invitation to the Southern District Joint</u> Proclamation Service

Hello everyone. I hope this message has found you well. The Southern District Ministers Association (SDMA) and Southern District Council cordially invite you to the Joint Proclamation Service of the 850th anniversary of Shinran Shonin's birth and the 800th anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu teaching. This special service will be held at the Gardena Buddhist Church on Sunday, October 30, 2022, at 10AM. All ministers in the Southern District and Rev. Marvin Harada, Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America will conduct the service, including the gagaku (ancient Japanese court music) performance. You can participate in the service either inperson or virtual via zoom. Please refer to the flyer in this Korin or check our orangecountybuddhist.com for registration. There will be no services at OCBC on Sunday, October 30th and the campus will be closed. So, we encourage all of you to join in this special service.

Prior to the official service by the headquarters temple called Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha (also known as Nishi Hongwanji) in Kyoto next year, SDMA will hold the joint proclamation service on October 30th.

In May 2023, OCBWA members and friends plan to fly to Japan and will participate in the official service at the Nishi Hongwanji and attend the 17th World Buddhist Women's Convention. I also plan to go with them. It will be a fabulous trip after long time covid closure. There will be a number of Shin Buddhists coming from all over the world to Kyoto next year to attend those commemorative events.

Let me share the message from Sennyo Gomonshu-sama (spiritual head) of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha. His message well explains the meaning of the special service that we will participate in October.

Namo Amida Butsu, Rev. Dr. Mutsumi Wondra Message on the Eight Hundred Fiftieth Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and Eight Hundredth Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching

The year 2023 will mark the 850th anniversary of Shinran Shonin's birth and 2024 will be the 800th anniversary of the establishment of the Jodo Shinshu teaching. To commemorate these occasions, we will be having the joint celebratory observance in 2023.

Shinran Shonin was born in 1173 and entered the priesthood at the age of nine. However, after devoting many years to monastic Buddhist practices on Mt. Hiei, he decided to descend the mountain at the age of 29. Following the guidance from his new mentor Honen Shonin, who introduced him to the Primal Vow of Amida Buddha, Shinran Shonin came to entrust himself to the Nembutsu teaching preached by his master. Several years later, their Nembutsu teaching was banned and Shinran Shonin was exiled to Echigo, present Niigata. Following his pardon, Shinran Shonin moved to the Kanto region where he engaged in propagation of the Nembutsu teaching of Other Power, namely the working of Amida's great wisdom and compassion. It is believed to be then when he began writing his main literary work, The True Teaching, Practice and Realization of the Pure Land Way, known as Kyōgyōshinshō. Since the essence of his teaching that emphasizes entrusting oneself to the Buddha's working of Other Power and recitation of the Nembutsu was clarified in the composition, the Kyōgyōshinshō is also referred to as gohonden, or the most foundational scripture of the Jodo Shinshu teaching. Based on Shinran Shonin's own inscription in the writing stating that he was 52 years of age at the time, the year 1224 became designated as the year when the Jodo Shinshu teaching was established.

Buddhism began approximately 2500 years ago when Śākyamuni became a Buddha, awakening to the true reality of this world, such as, the principles of dependent origination, impermanence, and no-self. However, ordinary people like us are neither able to realize the truth of enlightenment nor practice a life of nonattachment. To the contrary, we see things from our egocentric viewpoint and because of that we constantly suffer, encounter hardship, and fight with one another. That is why Śākyamuni Buddha informs us of the existence of Amida Buddha who had vowed to save all ordinary and foolish beings like us, by guiding us to supreme enlightenment. Furthermore, Shinran Shonin clarifies that we, as the recipient of Amida's working, have already received the Buddha's wish in the form of the Name, Namo Amida Butsu.

In the Rain You Get Wet

I would like to share with you one of my most favorite Buddhist stories. There are many like this one but this one really resonated with me. I would like to think of it as my legendary, quasi-autobiographical Buddhist journey.



There was a young boy who really wanted to learn about Buddhism. He decides to leave home to join a monastery on a faraway mountain top. He shaves his head and becomes a novice monk.

He quickly finds that he has far too many chores to do. Early each morning he has to clean the altar even though it seems like it is already clean. He must offer the Buddha breakfast prior to morning service which is before even his own breakfast after service. He finds it very difficult to chant on an empty stomach.

He really wants to study Buddhism but it doesn't seem like there is much time for that. Instead, he is always cleaning, making offerings, chanting and bowing. He wishes that more of his time was spent in lecture, learning the teachings.

He prefers being led from a premise to a conclusion but his teachers seem to talk around the subject, often speak in endless riddles. He didn't know this but his teachers wanted him to intuit the conclusion. This is called circumlocution but he thought it felt like they were just "talking in circles".

After a year, he was on the verge of quitting and began to complain to the head monk of his temple. He was hoping for a teaching but was instead given yet another task. It seemed like more of a punishment. The head monk needed a written message taken across town to an older, senor monk at another temple.

The young boy took the note, tucked it into his robes and went out the temple gates. He hadn't realized how far he had to walk. After two miles he was only half way there. He was not happy about this and even less so once it began to rain.

He finally made it to the temple soaking wet. He knocked on the large wooden doors and the older monk answered. The boy handed him the note, expecting a verbal response. But the older monk merely smiled and handed him yet another note. He felt like a carrier pigeon; no longer a novice monk.

He returned to his monastery after another four-mile walk, still in the pouring rain. He made it back, looking and feeling like a wet dog. Waiting for him at the monastery doors was his head monk. He was just standing there smiling as had the senior monk. He handed him the new note. Without reading it he placed into his robes still smiling.

Our young monk finally lost his temper. He was tired, cold and soaking wet. The head monk started laughing out loud. He looked at the poor boy and said "Why are you upset? Don't you know that when you go out into the rain, you get wet?"

It was in that moment that the young boy had a moment of sudden insight. The Buddha Dharma had been raining down upon him all along. He had been immersed in Buddhism all along and was soaked to the bone with it. The young boy now knew what the head monk had known all along. "When you go out into the rain, you get wet" – and now, for the first time, the young boy could exhale and practice.

I realized from this story that just being in a Sangha and showing up for services is enough to immerse myself within the teachings. It is not so much what we learn in an academic way but rather what we realize the teachings within our bodies and intuit them with our minds. It takes no real effort. It is as easy and natural as getting wet as we walk in the rain.

Life in the First Noble Truth

When I talk to non-Buddhists about Buddhism, something I come across is that people think Buddhism is just one thing. What I often get from people is that it's all about sitting in meditation and magically feeling good about yourself and the world. For myself before I went to OCBC, I must admit I had never heard of Shin Buddhism. Now of course, it is a central component of my life. Buddhism has spent the last 2500 years transmitting around the world. Not only would it be impossible for it not to change, but it was designed to be organic and be able to change to suit the new areas and cultures it enters.

When the Buddha was dying he said to his disciples, "Go and speak in the language of the people", meaning speak in a way that people will understand and help them the most. When asked, I usually tell people that there are probably as many schools of Buddhism as there are Christian denominations. Usually the main difference is an argument on the right path to enlightenment. In Shin Buddhism we are given a break from that difficult path and use the teachings to lead a better and happier life. Thank you Shinran!

But no matter what school of thought, all schools of Buddhism have the Four Noble Truths and the Eight Fold Path. Don't worry, I am not going to go through each one. I am just going to talk about the First Noble Truth.

But before I do that, a little side note about the Eight Fold Path. Here they are:

Right Views

Right Thoughts

Right Speech

Right Conduct

Right Livelihood

Right Energy

Right Mindfulness

Right Meditation

They are normally listed in this order and sometimes as 1 thru 8. We like to number things and put things in order. There is not really an order to the 8 fold path. You do not start with number one, master that and move on to number 2. Think of it as a circle. Jump on wherever you want and keep on going. You can also see it as something that organically happens to as you live your life in the Buddha Dharma. Ultimately, they are considered the cure for the First of the Four Noble Truth: Dukkha-Difficulty, Dissatisfaction comes from not living in accord with the truth of impermanence and interdependence.

Now for my latest issue with interdependence and impermanence.

I have been a bookseller at Barnes & Noble for about 15 years. One person I have worked with for all that time is my buddy Trevor. No, Trevor did not pass away, it's not going to be one of those kind of stories as he is alive and well! Trevor and I have not just had a good working relationship, but we have seen each other through a lot of major health issues and other very personal stuff. Trevor decided to live a quiet life and transferred to one of our stores in San Luis Obispo. After 15 years and taking things for granted this leaves a big hole for me. Causes and conditions have struck again!

So we do not have a choice of what happens to us, but we do have a choice on how we react. Although this does bring up the issue of whether or not we have free will, but I choose not to discuss that at this point in time.

I can be mad at Trevor for leaving or I can be a friend and be happy that he is doing something beneficial for himself. That seems like an easy decision, but it actually ends up not being what we always do. We stray from the Eight Fold Path.

Now along with doing the right thing for a friend, things change for me. In fact, things change no matter what. Impermanence! In 15 years there, I have worked with a lot of different people, most of whom I have liked. I have survived going through all that have come and gone and I will survive Trevor leaving too.

This is why we need to cherish the moment we are in and the people we are with. We can look back on all that we have gained and learned, but we need to go forward and keep moving with the flow of life. We will miss what we had in the past, but our connection with these people will always be part of us and who knows what the future will bring!


COVID – 19 Policy Update

The Shin Reader - The Buddha's Apprentices



Sumi Loundon is the author of the 2001 anthology, *Blue Jean Buddha: Voices of Young Buddhists*, a collection of personal essays by young adults ("twenty-somethings"), who, as her peers, she felt lacked a community in which they could share their experiences as young Buddhists. The book's success brought Loundon into contact with even greater numbers of Dharma students, but also brought to her attention, the large number of teenage practitioners whom she felt she

had overlooked. She also heard from older Buddhists who were inspired to share their experiences of their early years and their Dharma path as they matured. *The Buddha's Apprentices: More Voices of Young Buddhists* (2006) was written to address some of these missing stories, but also to reflect a deeper insight into the stories themselves. The essays reflect a diverse group of practitioners from around the world studying different schools of Buddhism.

The book is structured in four sections, the first three sections are divided by age groups, starting with essays by teenagers, followed with essays by people in their twenties and thirties which focuses on practices and relationships, and finally essays by "longtime Buddhists". The fourth and last section provides the author's reflection on the future.

The inspiring stories by teens highlight the mental stress youth face and how Buddhism has helped them. Some of the writers had to deal with initial pushback from their families. Many struggled to find access to Buddhist communities for support.

The section on young adults includes stories that focus on their experiences of practicing Buddhism, how they engaged in and navigated their Dharma path, as well as stories that focused on relationships, and how the Dharma teachings guided them in managing the transitions in relationships that are typical in the early adult years. One touching story was written by a biracial Zen nun who shared how the Buddhist teachings helped her forgive and understand her racist grandfather.

Thich Nhat Hanh shared a wonderful story of his early years as a novice monk in Vietnam and the memorable friendship he had with a French soldier who wanted to become a Buddhist.

In setting up the book in this structure starting with teens and ending with longtime Buddhists, Loundon wanted to present "how the spiritual life matures".

The final section titled "Looking Ahead" is a compelling discussion on supporting and nurturing young Buddhists. Based on the author's experiences as a young Buddhist, it asks how we can better support young practitioners, what's needed to help the next generation, and what they can do to help themselves. She identifies several challenges:

- 1) Young Buddhists are looking for communities of likeminded people for support and guidance.
- 2) Young Buddhists who want to take on active roles in Buddhist organizations need help in defining pathways for

career options.

3) Young Buddhists have daily life concerns that touch on relationships, family, education, etc. and they want to know how Buddhism can address these questions.

Loundon concludes by expressing her hope that as the community of young Buddhists continues to grow, we can cultivate this next generation to which we can pass on the teachings of Buddhism. She sees a large potential in Buddhist communities for the nurturing and support of youth and encourages a more conscious effort in offering these In the greater span of sixteen years since the publication of this book, it would be interesting to understand what type of changes have taken place and how the young practitioners feel today. Today's issues of mental health among young people would seem to encourage the growing interest in studying Buddhism and the practice of mindfulness. Social media and the internet have been very in supporting virtual communities influential communication among people studying the Dharma. Another new dimension is that of young Asian Americans who are becoming more active and vocal in their role as Buddhists, as expressed in Chenxing Han's 2021 book Be the Refuge: Raising the Voices of Asian American **Buddhists** as well as in the Young Buddhist Editorial (YBE) online forum launched in 2021. All this gives me optimism that the passion and voices of young Buddhists have not dimmed since their first stories that they shared with Sumi Loundon.
